
In 2002, Klaus was inducted into the International Paralympic Hall of Fame. He was also the recipient of the Shriners Humanitarian Award.

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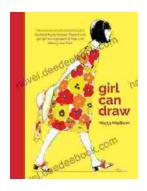
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
